Question 1

What difference should it make in the Church's ministries of compassion that human beings are made in the image of God? Use Scripture, and be thorough in your answer.

Question 2

If you could only emphasize three elements in starting and sustaining a vital ministry of compassion to display the justice and mercy of the Kingdom of God, what would they be? How would you establish the ministry, and with whom? What would you hope to accomplish? Be thorough in your answer.

Question 3

"The only true and enduring motivation for the ministry of mercy is an experience and grasp of the grace of God in the Gospel. If we know that we are sinners saved by grace alone, we will be both open and generous to the outcast and the unlovely," Timothy J. Keller, *The Ministries of Mercy*, p. 58. Do you agree or disagree with Mr. Keller's claim about the role the grace of God plays in ministering to those who are victims of injustice and cruelty. Whatever your position, provide scriptural support for your answer.
